totally restored and converted into offices. has become a runaway success in its first year. ouilding with new-build ones alongside And all but one have since been rented out, bringing new jobs and business to the area. It means a remarkable turnaround for The Orangery, which was built in 1723 and once stood in the grounds of Eltham House.

After years of neglect, it fell into ruin and was listed on the architectural 'at risk' register by English Heritage. Built in 2007 the Orangery ane building was taken over by Greenwich

Enterprise Board which worked with the council to restore and develop it.

Businesses that have moved in are delighted with the building and the facilities it offers. Dermot Rooney, a director with family-run civil engineering firm MJ Rooney, said: "I love it here. We moved from much smaller premises in New Eltham a year ago, and we wanted to stay local. We've got a big, open plan room for our office work. It's handy having the local services in Eltham High Street, such as a printers, and there are good transport links to other areas where we work, such as Kensington and Chelsea, as well as Blackheath

"We've since taken on six office staff at The Orangery and an additional 40 on our building sites. We want to continue to grow our business which is specialised work constructing building extensions below around level."

His business neighbours include education esourcing agency ITPER, which supplies teachers, support staff, caretakers and admin people to schools and further education colleges, for example for maternity cover or



for long-term contracts. Their customers are around 50 schools throughout London.

Deborah Hunt, ITPER's compliance manager, said: "We've been going 15 years, and been at The Orangery since April this year. We moved here from old offices in Greenwich that were cold, dated and too big. It's wonderful here, and the staff are so much happier. It's a lovely building, very bright and with air

"We are like a little community here. Having Eltham High Street nearby really makes it, with restaurants, supermarkets, cafes, parks and the Eltham Centre just around the corner

"It's a good place to work and with the good transport links it's easy to commute to. We've got parking spaces as well, which we were able to buy from the council."

Maximising business opportunities at The Orangery is all part of the council's Eltham Masterplan, designed to develop the town centre, improve its facilities economy, and create new jobs.
